BORROWING TEXTBOOKS

<u>Lippincott Library</u> has a collection of textbooks at their Reserve Deck. You can order textbooks at their InterLibrary Loan or BorrowDirect. Additionally, there is a <u>Free & For Sale Group on Facebook</u> where students can access second-hand books from other students.





MICROSOFT OFFICE AND MORE

For free access to Microsoft Office 365, Google Drive, One Drive, Dropbox, Penn + Box, Blue Jeans, Zoom, and Qualtrics survey tools visit the <u>Wharton Computing</u> <u>Resource</u> list. Many of these resources are also linked in the "<u>All Links</u>" section of MyWharton.

You can set up an <u>appointment</u> with the Student Tech Center and check with tech support before buying new technology. There is also 24/7 phone and chat available.



PENN LIBARIES

FREE VIRTUAL LAB

Students can access a lot of the software for classes using the <u>Virtual Lab</u> (including JMPwhich is needed for some STAT 101/102 courses).

MAGAZINE SUBSCRIPTIONS
